## Taking Care of God's Yard

When you come to our parish, you can't help but be amazed at our well-tended parish grounds. From time to time, they just may make you think of the Creator and all of His blessings. However, such landscaping work doesn't come by without diligent effort.

"We really appreciate all that the members of the Landscape Committee do," says Business Manager Rick Wright. "I have seen these guys out there working in 100-degree weather when they could be out playing golf. We want our grounds to look perfect for our parishioners when they come to church on Sunday, and that is what the committee helps us do."

The Landscape Committee is a group of volunteers that maintains the 28 acres of our parish property. At this time, the crew includes Ed Smith, David Moreno, Leonard Marusak, Phil Clark and Charles Ervine. They do the "hard work" of mowing, tree pruning, cleaning up, and edging outside of the courtyard and adjacent

building areas. They usually work at last four or five hours a week.

"We don't just eat donuts and drink coffee out there!" Charles says. "It is a much bigger job than people realize. We continue to get the property cleaned up more and more. Our group is so great! They are very cooperative and nice to work with, and they all pitch in."

In addition, our parish hires another crew to do the fine trimming, the weeding of the beds, and the hand mowing.

As pleasant as our parish property appears now, however, it was not always this way. It was once covered with rocks, debris and piles of concrete. Over time, the Landscape Committee has cleaned it up very well.

Charles, who started helping out on the parish grounds years ago, takes this ministry to heart, and is glad to be able to use his time and talent for the glory of God and the good of our parish community.

“When we moved out to this area in 1999 and joined St. Mark's, I wanted to contribute in some way,” he says. “I had a desk job until I retired, but I have always enjoyed working outside. When I first went to our parish, I looked around and I realized that the church really needed help with landscaping, so I decided to start at it. I am 79 years old, but I will probably continue doing this as long as I am able to.”

When asked what first inspired him to volunteer for this ministry, Charles has some thoughtful remarks to share.

“It is important for our church to look nice,” he says. “I would not want to live next to somebody who did not take care of their property. The church has a responsibility to make sure their property is inviting to others – and not an eyesore. There are nice homes in our neighborhood, and we should try to fit into the neighborhood.”

Charles has also found that being on the Landscape Committee is a wonderful way to live out his commitment to stewardship and enjoy fellowship.

“What we do would cost the church a considerable amount of money if they had to pay to have it done,” he says. “Being on the committee is a great way to get to know people, and the more you know people, the more involved you become with the church. It just kind of grows!”

# *We Are All Part of the Ministry of Hospitality*

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,


This is a time of many celebrations in the Church. The list is almost endless at this time of year – First Communion, Confirmations, graduations, and weddings. There are so many events that bring people who are not from the parish, or even members of the Church, into our parish.

You may recall that we speak of the Four Pillars of Stewardship – Hospitality, Prayer, Formation, and Service. I want to particularly speak of that pillar of Hospitality this month. It is important every day of every year and at everything we do as a parish community. However, at this time of year, when there may be strangers and newcomers in our midst, it becomes even more important.

Jesus is the cornerstone of our faith. In Matthew 25:35, the Lord speaks to us in terms of expectations when He says, “I was a stranger and you welcomed me.” He makes it clear to us that whenever we welcome any of His brothers and sisters, we welcome Christ Himself. Sometimes, we may think that this concept of hospitality is the responsibility of a committee, ministry or group of people assigned that task – but the truth is that we are all part of the parish hospitality effort.

If we are going to be a stewardship parish, and if each of us is going to be a good steward, we need to be aware that we need to seek and find Christ in everyone around us, everyone we meet, and certainly everyone who enters our church or other parish facilities.

Hospitality is a parish priority that each of us must take to heart. It is not so challenging to greet someone, smile at them and welcome them – yet, it may require a little extra effort on our part. That means we must have an awareness of those near us, of those who may appear to be alone or new. We may not always think of Christ in this way, but if we carefully



listen to Holy Scripture, we must realize that He was a caring, welcoming and friendly person. If we are to be His disciples, we need to be the same.

As stated, Jesus assures us that when we welcome others, we are welcoming Him, as well. St. Paul once said that people who are hospitable sometimes entertain angels. For us, parish hospitality is not an option. It is our way to model the Kingdom of God right here and right now.

When their children were growing up, Tom and Kim tried to teach them about the truths of our sacred faith and make sure they attended CCD classes.

“One of the commitments that Tom and I made to one another when we were first married was that we would always attend Mass together, and then as a family, once

aspect of their faith journey has been their involvement with adult ACTS retreats. They have both been on a number of retreats and have served as directors of the retreats, as well. Their daughter, Jessica, has also been on an ACTS retreat.

“We have always been involved in our parish, but going on the ACTS retreats has helped our personal spirituality and allowed us to achieve a better understanding of our faith,” Tom says. “On the retreats, we each experienced a turning point in our spiritual lives and gained a deeper relationship with God.”

Tom and Kim are also part of a supportive faith-sharing group called Denton Marrieds. This group has about 10 couples, and arose out of their participation with ACTS.

“We meet once a month to share our faith and our life experiences, as well as to help and encourage one another in living a faith-filled marriage,” Kim says. “In our monthly meetings, we come together as an extended family to share a meal, fellowship, prayer and faith study, much like the ‘Home Churches’ of the early Church.”

In the end, being involved with ACTS has given Tom and Kim what all Catholics truly need – the gift of fellowship.

“I believe Catholic people should hang out with other Catholic people,” Tom says. “It is great to build connections with people that share the same morals and the same principles as you and your family.”



- There were 299 Offertory Commitments, with an average annual pledge of \$2,704.


